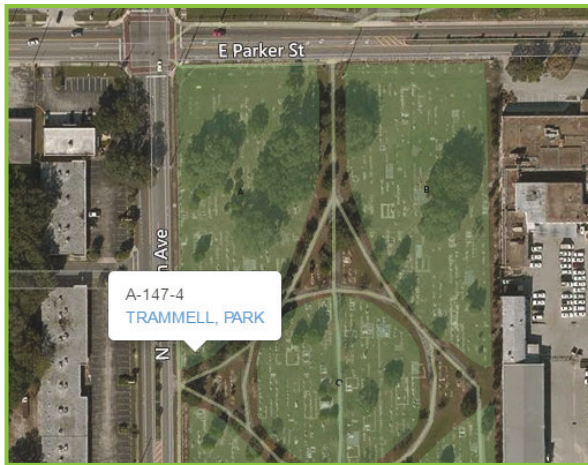

The Cemeteries Division is dedicated to providing well maintained burial parks for the citizens of Lakeland. The Cemetery Division operates and maintains six cemeteries at two locations.

OAK HILL BURIAL PARK

Oak Hill Burial Park consists of Oak Hill, Temple Emanuel and Laurel Hill cemeteries on 198 Acres.

Started in 1926, Oak Hill Burial Park is one of the largest perpetual care cemeteries in Polk County. The cemetery offers traditional adult burial spaces, infant spaces, cremation burial spaces, cremation columbarium niches and private mausoleum spaces. Fifteen percent of each lot sale is placed into the perpetual care fund which will be used to maintain the grounds once all lots are sold.

- Oak Hill Burial Park has a special section for veterans and their spouse.
- Privately owned mausoleum areas are available.
- Above-ground granite columbarium niches are available for individual cremated remains.
- Payment plans may be available. Please contact us for further details.

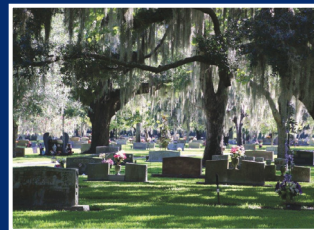

LAKELAND'S HISTORIC CEMETERIES

The City of Lakeland's oldest cemeteries are Lakeview, Roselawn and Tiger Flowers located at Ingraham Avenue and Lake Parker Street just north of downtown. The cemeteries date back to 1886 and are the final resting areas for some of Lakeland's early settlers and business and civic leaders.



Park Trammell was a Lakeland Mayor, Florida Attorney General, Florida Governor, US Senator and State Senator. He was buried in Roselawn Cemetery in

1936. John D. Torrence was the first person buried in Lakeview Cemetery on March 13, 1886. Additionally, Polk County educator William A. Rochelle is buried in Tiger Flowers. In 1949, Washington Park High School was re-named in his honor.

All spaces have been sold for many years and there are approximately 10 burials each year. Also at Roselawn cemetery is the Scott Morris Mausoleum which was built in 1923.

GENERAL RULES

- To have an upright family monument a lot must contain four spaces. In other areas, only flush markers are permitted. These memorials must be located in accordance with the general layout of the cemetery.
- The City may remove any flower, weed, shrub or plant of any kind if the superintendent determines it is unsightly, diseased or if it detracts from the dignity or appearance of the cemetery.
- Flower receptacles may not be placed on any plot unless it consists of galvanized iron, aluminum, bronze or other rust-resisting material. The size and design must be approved by the superintendent and set beneath the level of the grass. (except for urns of marble or granite that are part of the monument) Flower receptacles may be purchased at the cemetery office. All flower receptacles must be placed by the City or the monument company.
- The City is not responsible for floral pieces, baskets, frames or receptacles in or to which flowers are placed or attached.
- The City is not responsible for any planting damaged by the elements, thieves, vandals or any other cause beyond the City's control.
- No planting of flowers, shrubs or herbage of any kind is permitted on plots in the cemetery.
- Any item consisting of glass, brick, cement, wood, metal (except temporary metal markers) and any toys, souvenirs or emblems are prohibited from being placed on any lot.
- Lot owners may place one bouquet of flowers on each grave, providing they are placed in an approved ground-level vase or in a vase that is part of the memorial. Any extra decoration placed during holidays or other special occasions will be removed in thirty (30) days.
- The use of shepherd hooks will be permitted. One shepherd hook will be allowed per space or two shepherd hooks per two and four grave lots.
